GENERAL INFORMATION

Venue & Transportation

- All panels and keynote addresses will take place in the <u>Mercado C building</u>, at the NE corner of Fifth Street and Monroe, on Arizona State University's Downtown Campus in Phoenix (not to be confused with the main campus in Tempe).
- The venue is easily accessible from Sky Harbor International Airport. The most costeffective way to get to downtown Phoenix from the airport is to take the light rail. From
 arrivals, follow signs for the Sky Train. Take the Sky Train to the 44th St. & Washington
 light rail stop. Take the Light Rail westbound toward downtown Phoenix. The 3rd St &
 Washington stop is a few blocks south of the venue; the 1st Ave & Van Buren stop is also
 close.
- Our dinner venue <u>Gallo Blanco</u> is within easy walking distance from the venue. <u>The Heard Museum</u> is a long walk or a short light rail to the Encanto & Central Ave light rail stop.

Food

On Thursday and Friday, breakfast and lunch will be provided to all conference participants free of charge at the conference venue. Our conference dinner will take place at Gallo Blanco Café, which serves Oaxacan-inspired Mexican food crafted from locally sourced ingredients. Our prix-fixe dinner, included in conference fee, will feature a selection of appetizers, an entree (including a vegetarian option), dessert, and two drink tickets, redeemable for either a margarita, a selection of beers, or soft drinks. Participants will be responsible for the food and drink at the optional welcome happy hour at Arizona Wilderness Brewing and the farewell lunch at the Heard Museum Café.

Heard Museum Tour

Our optional tour of The Heard Museum Saturday morning, one of the nation's premier collections of Indigenous art, will be led by assistant curator Velma Kee Craig, who is also a celebrated Diné (Navajo) writer and artist. The admissions fee (not covered by conference registration) is \$17.
